A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A KWMU STATEHOUSE REPORTER

My work day begins at home. Before leaving for the office, I go online to see if any legislative events are scheduled for the day, then plan accordingly. There are more events to cover, naturally, when the General Assembly is in session (from January to May). During session, it's more likely that I'll cover stories into the evening hours. This is especially the case with the Missouri Senate. There were several occasions in 2007 when they debated bills late into the night, and there were even a few all-night sessions, thanks to a few filibusters. When these happen, I divide my hours between the Senate floor, gathering audio, and the production studio, writing scripts and editing the sound I've gathered.

The stories I produce depend on landing interviews with various newsmakers: Governor Blunt, top lawmakers, cabinet members, agency heads, business leaders, etc. The production studio where I work has equipment that enables me to record

phone calls for the purpose of conducting interviews. When doing interviews in person, I use a digital recorder and microphone, which has a sound quality much better than that of much-older cassette recorders.

My primary duty is to report on what's happening within state government. During session, this means paying attention to new bills being filed, committee meetings, open debate, and numerous press conferences. Some days will be loaded with events, which sometimes requires evaluating which ones are more important to cover on that particular day. Other days will be extremely slow, particularly Fridays, which lawmakers like to take off. Another primary responsibility is covering the governor's State of the State Address each



year. Our News Director, Bill Raack, hosts the broadcast from our St. Louis studio, while I co-host from the House chambers, where the address is delivered. There are many bills and resolutions that cover

dozens of issues, but there are a few that I cover regularly: health care/Medicaid, education, tax policy, immigration, transportation, and the budget itself. In my first year here, I've found these six to be the most talked-about issues inside the Capitol building.

Between May and December, when the General Assembly is out of session, it is less busy, but there is still plenty of work to do. During this period I've covered various lawsuits before circuit judges and before the Missouri Supreme Court. The Public

Service Commission has conducted hearings into the Taum Sauk reservoir collapse, and into rate hike requests. Other commissions and task forces regularly hold meetings. State audits are conducted and published regularly. Governor Blunt calls press conferences on various issues, and the looming election year triggers the occasional blow-up between the governor and the Attorney General, Jay Nixon. And in December, interim committees meet regularly in preparation for the next legislative session. All of these give me plenty to do when lawmakers are out of session.

I am the only KWMU reporter who lives and works full-time in Jefferson City. My office and production studio are inside the State Capitol building, one floor down from the governor's office and two floors below the House and Senate chambers, giving me quick access to those who make policy for the state of Missouri.

1972 KWMU signed on the air for the first time on June 2, 1972.

Ben Abell began doing weather reports for KWMU and Bill Conway provided stock updates.

1974 Harry G. Mellman wrote a check contributing \$100 to KWMU. It was the first listener contribution received by the station.

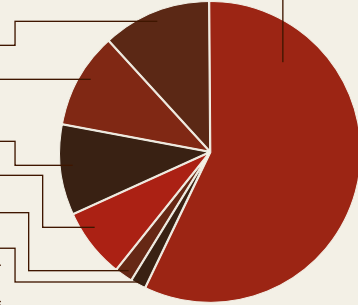
1975 KWMU held its first ever membership drive. Listeners pledged more than \$7,200 during the fundraising campaign.

KWMU REVENUES & EXPENSES FY 2007

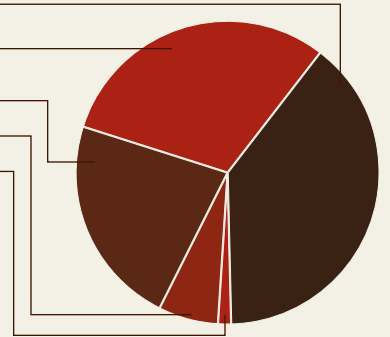

1980 *Morning Edition* with host Bob Edwards had its debut on KWMU on September 15, 1980.

1982 *All Things Considered* was first broadcast by KWMU on May 17, 1982 with hosts Susan Stamberg and Sanford Unger.

1983 KWMU was the first station in St. Louis to play music from compact discs (CD's).

1984 KWMU made history by becoming the first station in the United States to broadcast ambisonic programs. Ambisonics is a recording and broadcasting system that engulfs the listener in 360 degrees of sound, like the experience of a live performance.

1985 *Morning Edition* with Bob Edwards broadcast live from KWMU studios September 25-27, 1985.

1990 The name of KWMU's community support organization was changed to "Friends of KWMU, Inc."

1991 KWMU offices underwent a \$150,000 renovation.

UM-St. Louis Chancellor Blanche M. Touhill received the "Eugene L. Asher" Award for distinguished service to public radio. She was nominated by KWMU.

1993 In January, KWMU hosted a live national broadcast in St. Louis of *Whad'Ya Know?* with Michael Feldman.

1993 In February, KWMU hosted a live national broadcast in St. Louis of Garrison Keillor's program, *American Radio Company*.

1994 KWMU began a promotional campaign using the theme, "What in the World is Going On?"

National Public Radio President Delano Lewis came to St. Louis to help KWMU kick-off its "Campaign for Excellence," an equipment replacement project.

1995 KWMU's news staff won a record 22 state, regional and national awards.

1996 The spring fund drive raised a record \$173,515 for KWMU.

1996 KWMU achieved an all-time high number of weekly listeners: 128,900.

KWMU became St. Louis' first FM news station, when it moved to an all news, talk, and entertainment format.

1997 KWMU receives first place for excellence in its Corporate Support Program in national DEI competition.

For the first time ever, KWMU carried the Missouri and Illinois governor's State of the State speeches live. KWMU was the only station in St. Louis to cover Governor Carnahan's address.

1998 For the first time in KWMU's history, members of the Friends of KWMU contributed more than \$1 million to the station.

In addition to being the visionary and founding member of KWMU, Dr. Driemeier has served several terms on the KWMU Friends board, volunteered his time and given of his expertise to benefit the station in countless ways. The Donald H. Driemeier Endowment Fund was established at KWMU in 1999, as a means to fund local programming for regional and national distribution for many years to come.

Ben Abell

For 34 years, Ben Abell volunteered his time to provide KWMU listeners with weather forecasts. He helped thousands dress appropriately and get to and from work on time. April 29, 2007 marked Ben's last day on the air, as he settled into a much-deserved retirement.
